

## **Fire Safety Advice**



#### Fire Action Plan on Discovering a Fire in your Home

If a fire starts in your home, there are 3 steps that can save your life.

- Get out
- Never go back inside
- Call 999 as soon as you are safe to do so

If you can't get out, find a safe place to remain and close the door. Packing clothes and blankets around the door will help to keep smoke out.

Go to a window, shout for help and call 999.

#### **General Fire Safety Advice**

To protect yourself, your family and other residents within the close we advise the following:

- Refrain from smoking in the close area
- Do not leave items in the close areas including bikes/ scooters or furniture
- Carry out weekly tests of your smoke/ heat alarm systems
- Don't leave bins or items against the building

### Fire Action Plan on Discovering a Fire in the Common Close

If you suspect a fire has started in the common close you should:

- stay in your flat, keep the front door closed and call 999
- pack a towel or sheets around the bottom of the front door to stop smoke getting in
- go to an open window and wait for the arrival of the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service

You should stay in your home and keep the front door closed unless:

- you are directly affected by heat, smoke or fire
- Fire and Rescue Service or Police tells you to get out
